

Rector's Report

As we look toward the year ahead, I would like to offer the following as a continued vision for my ministry among you:

Additionally, you may have noted it in our Sunday bulletins:

Our Core Values Being present with our Lord and with each other every Lord's Day. Committed to growing in our knowledge and love of the Lord. Serving each other and the world around us in His name.

This is a simple statement of holistic Christianity that we formulated in our earliest days as a church family. It represents a churchmanship that is complete and transformative; that is, a faith that is making a difference in who we are and how we live our lives. Hopefully each of us will recognize in these three categories where we should strive to be more faithful to Christ.

2019 and Beyond

And finally, let me offer some goals for 2019 and beyond:

- That each member of this church family individually living our core values of worship, study and service.
- That we position ourselves financially to be able to call a high energy, Spirit-filled and visionary priest this year to become our new Rector as I step back from leadership of this church family.
- That we start providing a tithe (10%) to the diocese- The diocesan funds are largely used for new church planting and clergy formation. We presently pledge to the diocese about 5% of our operating budget (our operating budget are expenses related to running this church, including its outreach obligations, less special funds such as capital Improvements fund, contingency fund, memorial fund, etc.)
- To eliminate the mortgage on our existing facility. Amazing progress has been made on this. Thanks everyone!
- That we sacrificially grow our outreach budget to 50% of the operating budget (presently it is \$30,000, which is about 20% of our operating budget).
- To establish a reserve fund of half our annual operating budget for unforeseen events and needs.
- Become a community church and community center for the folk living around us, and be a beacon drawing our neighbors to Christ and to the fellowship of the Body of Christ.
- That we ontinue to grow spiritually, financially and numerically such that our existing facilities become inadequate for our worship and ministries, and we build new worship space on our 2.3 acres on the other side of Merovan Drive, allowing our existing facilities to eventually evolve into a place for youth and community outreach.

Much of this may seem daunting and out of reach, but it reflects the real opportunity we have to become Christ's incarnational presence in the Sweetwater/Walnut Lane Community and beyond, and to grow the Kingdom of God in our little corner of God's world.

I want to thank all of you for the way you are already contributing to this.

The Vestry

Vestry membership is an important ministry. The forward momentum of this parish depends heavily on the vision, discernment and leadership of this group. The Vestry has the canonical responsibility for directing the temporal affairs of this church family. According to the parish bylaws, the Vestry is composed of six members elected by the congregation, each for a three-year term. Each year, two members of the Vestry rotate off and two new members are elected. From their number, the Vestry selects the parish's Senior and Junior Wardens. The Senior Warden works

closely with the Rector in the administration and leadership of the parish. The Junior Warden oversees the building and grounds. The Vestry also includes as non-voting members the Parish Treasurer/Finance Committee and the Clerk of the Vestry.

Senior Warden's Report- Mike Fekula

Thank you to those who so faithfully engage in ACHTNA's many activities and ministries. Our church was once again very active in 2018. The various ministries offer their reports throughout this document, so I will limit my comments to two past events and three very important future considerations.

As you look to the west from the Church building, there is a new road called *Welcome Way*. Could any church ask for a better name leading to its doors? We pray that the light of Christ will shine through us in an incredibly welcoming way upon our visitors and potential members, as well as continually upon our current members. When we solicited names for the new road, it was Sue James who submitted *Welcome Way*. Thank you to Sue for submitting this divinely inspired name. A special note of gratitude goes to those whose sacrificial giving made the road possible. As you are aware, construction of this type is very expensive, especially considering city building, zoning, and traffic safety requirements. Furthermore, this project would not have been completed without the tireless efforts of Father Rob, as he rose to the challenges of dealing with the city regulators, engineers, and construction contractors. Finally, the glory goes to God. We recently received information that the road might be more valuable than its cost and the potential exists for ACHTNA to recoup much, if not all, of its investment in this project.

The ACHTNA Clergy and invited speakers conducted another highly professional educational program during our Teaching Weekend, held October 26-28. The title of the program was *Human Relationships through the Lens of Scripture*. In 2019 the teaching weekend will be held on October 25-27. Please save this date to ensure that you can attend. The Vestry has looked at the calendar and, to the extent possible, deconflicted this date with other significant events that might preclude your attendance.

Rector, Responsibility, and Renovation. Regarding the future, three related "Rs" stand prominent. As Father Rob's retirement approaches, ACHTNA must seek a new rector. While the Diocese will fully support our efforts in this area by identifying prospective candidates and search support, it is our responsibility to provide the compensation for

a full-time rector. In order to do that, the mortgage debt on our building must be paid down. God is blessing us with some possible options that could make that happen in the near term. Please join all ACHTNA members in accepting the responsibility to "Pray off" the mortgage. Finally, you will notice some renovation activity over the next few weeks. Driven by prayers and a strategic perspective, your Vestry thought it vitally important to enhance the appearance of our worship space by making some desperately needed improvements. The Diocese also agreed and made a significant monetary contribution to this effort. Not only will these renovations provide an appealing atmosphere to visitors, prospective members, and current members, we expect that candidates for rector will see ACHTNA as a place where they are both called to serve and would like to bring their family.

Gambella, Ethiopia and St Frumentius' Anglican Theological College

Gambella is a particularly poor and underdeveloped region of Ethiopia. Being in the White Nile River valley, the weather is extraordinarily hot at certain times of the year. Most of the people are non-literate. Basic resources such as water, electricity, phone service and internet are not easily available. Refugees from war-torn South Sudan make up well over 50% of the Gambella region's population. The Anglican Church is fast growing with approximately 120 churches and 15,000 Anglican Christians. These churches are part of the Diocese of Egypt, North Africa and the Horn of Africa.

Clergy are extremely few. St. Fermentius' College was thus started by the Rev. Dr. Johann Vanderbaijl under the authority of the area bishop, The Rt. Rev. Grant LeMarquand, to address this need and develop indigenous clergy and lay leaders. Holy Trinity's support to Gambella has largely gone to developing this seminary.



Report from SAMS Missionaries, Father Johann and Louise Vanderbaijl

Training Disciples to Make Disciples in Southern Africa



We spent two years helping to develop the St. Frumentius Seminary in Gambella, Ethiopia. At present, we are mostly working in Southern Africa where we are serving in seven southern African countries, although we continue to work with the Diocese of Egypt, North Africa, and the Horn of Africa as well as other southern and northern African countries, through engaging in a disciple making movement in order to grow the body of Christ. We are partnering with J-Life and other like-minded ministries. This ministry is massive and has the ability to reach thousands.



We are sent through the Society of Anglican Missionaries and Senders, a missionary sending community engaging in building relationships with the worldwide church to experience the broken restored, the wounded healed, the hungry fed, and the lost found through the love and power of Jesus Christ.

The Lydia Project~ Margaret Williams

The Lydia Project provides support and services to women undergoing cancer treatment. This support and services includes lodging, assistance with rent/mortgage while out of work for treatment, utilities to keep the lights on, and transportation to and from the Lydia House to treatment.

Members who volunteer at the Lydia Project are Margaret Williams who volunteers in lodging at the Daksha Chudgar / Lydia House. Women who live 30 minutes or more away from Augusta cancer treatment centers are provided lodging, meals, and support in the Lydia House.

Community Ministry of North Augusta

We contribute both financially and materially to this ministry. CMONA offers an opportunity to love our neighborsespecially those in the Area Two school district of North Augusta and Belvedere- in very practical ways. Sadly, about 2,500 North Augusta residents (about 12%) live in poverty. About 14% of our under-65 neighbors don't have any health insurance. CMONA starts with a comprehensive assessment to discover exactly what the family or individual truly needs. They **listen** to their challenges and develop **action plans** to help them navigate their crisis so they can finally become **self-sufficient**. That assessment allows them to minister to families holistically.



Family Promise has returned to Holy Trinity!

We were honored to serve twice this past year as a host church to Family Promise families for a week at the time. Many hands and hearts were needed to ensure that we made our families feel welcomed and loved during that week. Areas of service included: folks willing to pray before and during the week, workers to set up and break down bedrooms in our Sunday School classrooms, cooks to prepare supper and serve each evening and weekend, couples to spend each night, hosts and hostesses each afternoon, and other hosts for all day Saturday.

Family Promise of Augusta is committed to helping homeless families of the surrounding area to achieve lasting independence by providing safe shelter, meals, cost-free day care, and support services for these families. Family Promise also partners with programs designed to redress the underlying causes of homelessness. God is at work all around us. We are thankful when He calls us to be a part of that work. *Twyla Tuten*



Megiddo- Our local job-training ministry

This local ministry strives to create self-sustaining families and individuals through intensive and effective job and personal skill training. The program has 558 graduates in full-time employment since 2013. It has a 97% placement rate and a 95% job retention for 1 year or more.

Student profiles for 2017-18 class include: 78 students, 35 with felony convictions, 19 homeless, 69 out of work for more than 5 years, 47 with Associates Degree or higher, including 18 with Masters, and 22 Veterans.

I have been privileged to teach communication and soft skills in 4 or 5 cycles of training classes. It is a blessing to me to work alongside other dedicated volunteers with such committed and appreciative students.

Spiritual Formation

Children's Nursery ~ Kimber Nault

The nursery, directed by Kimber Nault, is available for children ages 0 - 3 years on Sunday mornings, Wednesday evenings, and during other special church gatherings.

Children's Church ~ Jennifer Patterson

Children's Church is a special time of teaching and worship for children ages 4 to 8. In 2018, we began the year with lessons from Jesus' ministry. After a series of lessons, through May, on the story of the Holy Week, we focused on the teachings of Jesus through his parables. This led us through the summer and into the beginning of the school year. Starting in September, we highlighted key stories of the Old Testament, from the creation account in Genesis to the building of the first temple and then the exile of the Jewish people. Finally, we closed out the year with a study of Advent as we retold the Christmas story with each symbol to adorn the Jesse Tree.

During the last worship service song, and right before the "First Lesson," the children gather at the cross at the side door of the sanctuary where we process to the children's church room. At that time, we share in prayer and a biblical lesson. After our lesson, usually based on the curriculums: "Young Children and Worship" and "Godly Play," the children engage in a form of creative expression related to the lesson or story for that day. Many respond with a drawing, with modeling in clay or even with a pantomime of some aspect of the lesson. We then line up, behind the cross, to process back into the sanctuary, usually in time for the "Passing of the Peace."

Children's Church attendees ranged in number from 1 to 12 on any given Sunday. Presenters for 2018 were Tracy Perdue, Doris O'Neill and Jennifer Patterson. A special "Thank You" to Doris for so faithfully organizing and presenting Children's Church lessons and the schedule for so many years, and for her kind help in passing this work on to Tracy and Jennifer this summer.

Thank you for your supportive prayers over the 2018 year. Your children are a delight and it is our privilege to share God's Word and ministry with them! Please continue to join us in prayer for them and for us in this growing relationship with our Lord in 2019!

Children's Sunday School- Dianne Havird, Margaret Williams and Nancy Hartley

Our children's Sunday school classes have covered a variety of topics since our parish report from last year. The children have learned about the person of Jesus and what knowing Him means to each one of them. They studied about the Day of Pentecost and, in the lessons that followed, they learned that the Holy Spirit lives in them, empowers them, teaches them and walks with them.

The children also studied about Jesus' first miracle and some of the parables He told. The majority of the year was focused on the book of Exodus, the life of Moses and the People of Israel. Just before the holidays, we ended our study of Exodus with the death of Moses and Joshua leading the People of Israel into the Promise Land. For their Thanksgiving lesson, the children read about why Moses and Miriam were thankful. Whenever it was possible, we teachers helped the children make connections with some of the key people they had learned about in their study of Genesis the previous year. The lessons were interspersed with videos that reinforced what the children were studying.

There have been wonderful discussions in the classes as well as many crafts and other fun activities. The most difficult craft was weaving a basket that accompanied the lesson of Moses being placed in a basket, sent down a river and, as the story goes, was rescued and raised by the pharaoh's daughter.

The children learned about Lydia House and its ministry to women cancer patients. They wrapped gifts for a Christmas gift basket that was delivered to the women. Each of the children signed a card wishing the women Christmas blessings.

We have enjoyed being with your children and learning with them about our God. God is truly an awesome God and an amazing Teacher. He delights in our study of Him through His Word.

Sunday Morning Adult Forum

Michael Patterson led us on November 4 during forum time as we observed the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church; he will be joining the facilitator team in January. All adults are invited to participate in forum.

Tuesday Morning Women's Bible Study ~ JoEllen Barbare



Our Women's Bible Study has been a tremendous blessing to all the women who attend. We began the year studying the Book of Hebrews taught by Dr. Michael Krueger from RTS Seminary in Charlotte, NC. We covered the first eight chapters and then took a semester break. During the break we studied Covenant using Kay Arthur's workbook and DVD. This study took us through the Abrahamic Covenant, the Old Covenant,



and the New Covenant. A study of these covenants ties in beautifully with the Book

of Hebrews. When we complete our study of Covenant, we will return to our study of the Book of Hebrews with Dr. JoEllen Krueger.

First Tuesday Prayer ~ Jackie Fekula

First Tuesday Prayer takes place the first Tuesday of every month after the Ladies' Bible Study ends, at approximately 11:30am in the Fellowship Hall. Even if there is no Bible Study that Tuesday, we still meet for prayer. Everyone is welcome to join us, whether you attend the Bible Study or not. Men are surely welcome - this is open to every worshiper in our Church.

We start off with worship and praise, and continue to worship Him in prayer and intercession for all the needs in our Church as Holy Spirit leads. We began this year with a wonderful, dedicated core group of ladies; and we pray that the Lord by His Spirit will add to our numbers in 2019 those who see prayer as a high priority for our church and their own lives.

Jesus said in Matthew 21:13 "It is written, My House shall be called a House of Prayer...." In loving obedience to our Lord Jesus Christ, we will continue to worship and draw close to Him in this special ministry of "love on its knees." Please join us!

Wednesday Nights at Holy Trinity ~ Twyla Tuten

On Wednesday nights, members of the Holy Trinity family gather for fellowship supper, praise and prayer, and an opportunity for spiritual growth.

We started the year with a two-week study of the how the King James version of the Bible came to be translated and published. We often take it for granted, but having a Bible available to read in one's own language was something of a revolutionary idea in the 15th and 16th centuries – not to mention the various factions within the Christian faith that did not agree on how this was to be done. Wayne shared an excellent DVD with us.

Throughout much of the year, we worked our way through an intensive study of the gospel of Mark, coinciding with year B in our liturgy.

Lent 2018 we spent in a series of lessons of renewal and self-examination: be aware, be pliable, be obedient, be assured, and be steadfast.

At the end of May and through June, we took another break from the study of Mark to examine the prayer of Jabez: Bless me indeed, Enlarge my territory, Keep Your hand upon me, and Keep me from evil.

In September we revisited the last portion of the prayer of Jabez ("Keep me from evil"). Wayne led us in considering subtleties of evil and generational sins that may hinder one from living out one's life in the power of the Holy Spirit.

We were honored to have Bishop Steve Wood with us on a Wednesday in October.

Also in October, Twyla led us in a lively series of lessons entitled "The Story of Scripture: Hooks to hang your hat on!" We looked at fourteen major "hooks" on which to hang the big stories of the Bible. She promised us that she will soon teach us how to play Prophetable Play – to organize the major and minor prophets of the Old Testament by nation and time frame.

Our Advent study this year was Max Lucado's "Because of Bethlehem" DVD and discussion series. Max challenged us to prepare ourselves for Christmas as we considered: God has a face, worship works wonders, God guides the wise, and every heart has a manger.

All are invited on Wednesday evenings to come and grow with us!

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper Fundraiser for Community Ministries of North Augusta

The celebration of Shrove Tuesday (the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday) is a centuries-old tradition. The name **Shrove** has its roots in an old English word meaning, "**to confess.**" Shrove Tuesday has been a time to confess sins and to prepare for the penitential season of Lent. It also has been a traditional time to use up food items such as fats, eggs and milk that would be given up as part of a Lenten fast. The tradition of eating pancakes on Shrove Tuesday came about as a way to use up these items. In the French culture, the consumption of all fats on this day became known as "Fat Tuesday" or *Mardis Gras*.
